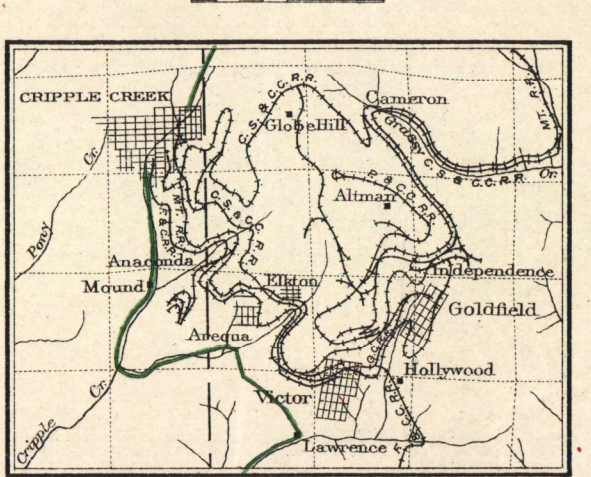
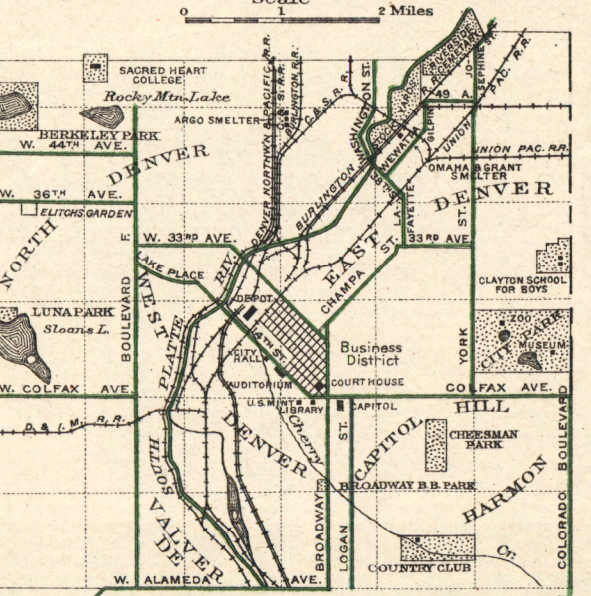
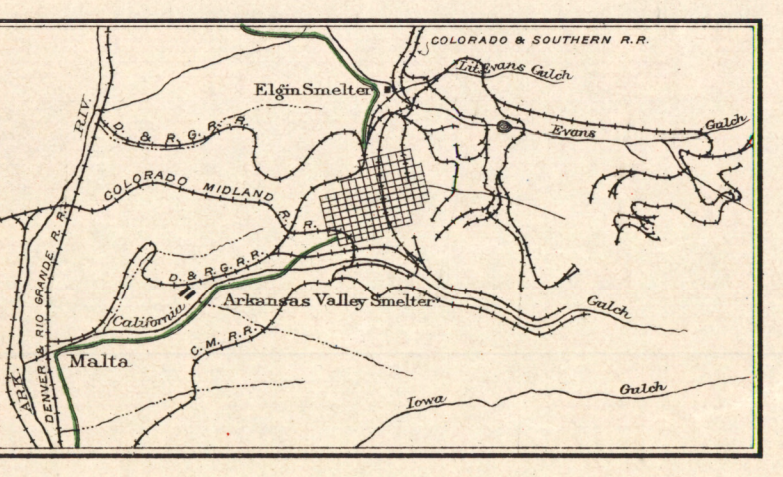
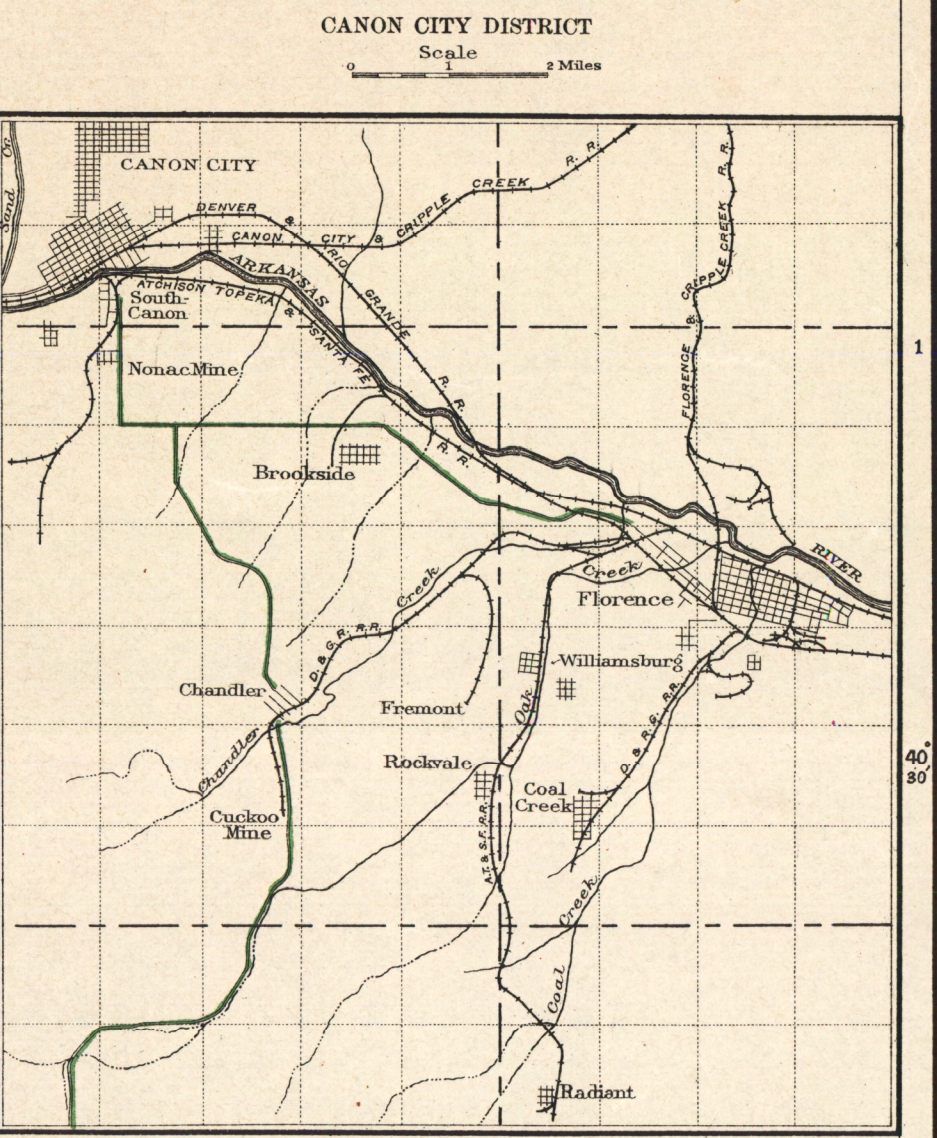



TOPOGRAPHIC MAP OF COLORADO
